Being the Church at Brentwood

Rich? Who Me?

Ps 130 & 2 Corinthians 8:7-15

476, 358, 530, 563

In this section of the compilation of Paul's writings to the Corinthians, he is talking about money.

Paul is raising again with the Corinthian church something that he had discussed with them before – a collection being made for the poor in Rome.

He is urging generosity in giving.

We do not have detailed information on the relative wealth or poverty of the church in Corinth as compared to the church in Rome. There are clearly some complex dynamics going one here – giving for others as opposed to keeping it for ourselves; the tensions between the Jewish and Gentile wings of the emerging church; how needs are assessed and what responses are appropriate; and comparing the generosity of one community with that of another.

I will come back to the issue of generosity in the church in a moment.

Where I want to start this morning is with Paul's explanation of the motivation for giving.

As with everything in his theology,
it begins with what God has done for us in Jesus Christ.
It begins with the riches that God has bestowed on us
through the grace of Jesus Christ.
At the heart of those riches
is our reconciliation with God,
the restoration of the relationship that God intended with humanity in creation,
the close intimacy of friends with a compassionate companion,
of children with a loving and revered parent.

Out of that relationship, that faith in the source and sustaining power of our lives, all that is good emerges as we flourish in the grace of Jesus Christ.

> The joy of faith, the stimulation of speech, the wisdom of knowledge, the energy of compassion, and the comfort of love.

As elsewhere in his writings,
here love and compassion for others is the real test of faith for Paul.
Are we treating others as God treated us in Jesus Christ?
Are we drawing on our spiritual riches
in order to use our material riches,
however large or small they may be,
in the service of God's commonwealth?

We are all richer than we can imagine through the grace of Jesus Christ.

We are all richer than we can imagine through the quality of relationship with the Creator that Christ has made possible for all of us.

We are all richer than we can imagine through the power and potential we have to do good by virtue of being friends with God, amigos de Christo, companions of the Lord.

We are all richer than we can imagine through being made whole in order to flourish in the grace of Jesus Christ, being a blessing in everything that we do.

We are all richer than we can imagine through the nourishment that we get week by week in the welcoming, supportive, stimulating community of the friends of Jesus Christ found here at Brentwood Presbyterian.

Those are the spiritual gifts that make us all rich, the spiritual gifts we all enjoy through God's generosity.

And what about our generosity?

I just want to sow a few thoughts this morning about the practicalities of being the church of Jesus Christ here at Brentwood in North Burnaby.

We have served this community with dedication for almost 50 years now.

Many of you,
along with others who graced these pews over those years, gave of your time, talent, and treasure to make this church a blessing in this community.

You've seen good times and bad times, times of plenty and times of scarcity.

Dramatic changes have happened in the community around us and they have had an impact on this congregation.

Here's how I see our current situation.

We want to grow in faith, in numbers, in service to this community, and in resources to sustain and expand our mission through a variety of ministries that will benefit our neighbourhood.

To do that, we need many things.

First and foremost, we need the kind of prayer that will keep us aligned with God's will for this community.

Second, we need to be constantly exploring with each other what might be possible and feasible to do to ensure a flourishing future build on the foundations already laid.

Third, we need to give generously as the Lord has prospered us to provide the material resources to support Brentwood's mission and ministries and to manage our resources wisely to generate several streams of revenue.

That is already happening here and we can improve on what we are doing.

Givings in the collection plate have risen considerably over the past couple of years and we need to continue that form of generosity.

We are not generating as much revenue as we did three years ago through the rental of our facilties and we need to address that in our conversations with BTPC.

We are being successful in getting various grants for special ministries, for our ESL through Music and our community services.

Many of us are richer in accumulated resources than we are in usable resources, largely because our houses and condos have appreciated so much in value. We need to give some thought to leaving a bequest to this congregation, to building up our endowment fund so it becomes a steady stream of revenue for the mission and ministries of this congregation.

All of this generosity of material resources is grounded in our gratitude for what God has given us, especially what God has provided for us through this congregation of his church.

Brentwood deserves our prayers, our gifts of time and talent, and our generosity with our treasure.

I pray that the Holy Spirit will use these reflections to help you flourish in the grace of Jesus Christ.

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
