Our Scripture readings and Memorize & Ponder texts will be taken mostly from the gospel of Matthew. His focus in telling the stories of Jesus is on the fulfillment of God's promises to creation recorded in the Hebrew Scriptures. This is a Jewish Jesus, God's promised Messiah. But the ways God's promises were fulfilled in Jesus scandalized most people of his day (and perhaps of ours?) with their apparent foolishness. We invite you to **listen** for what the Spirit is saying in the text, then **question** how those insights might change the ways you see things and act in the world. Use the questions on the back of this insert to provoke your thinking. We look forward to hearing the about those insights during our 'Words to Ponder' conversation in the worship service.*
