## Life's Melody Line

Micah 6:8

He has told you, O mortal, what is good; and what does the Lord require of you but to do justice, and to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God.

- in our heart of hearts, what I would call our souls, I think we all want to be good – but what is good? – what do we have to pay attention to, what do we have to commit to, what do we have to support, in order to be and expand goodness in our world?
- those are tough questions, especially in our world of murdered and missing indigenous women across Canada, teens and their teachers slaughtered in schools, millions driven from their homes by sectarian violence, nationalist posturings of agression and threats of nuclear war – this does not seem to be a 'good' world!
- there is long tradition in in Judeo-Christian communities of lament

   of voicing pain and sorrow to make the lack of goodness clear,
   and felt, and heard it's the source of the blues in music and
   the blues is a formative musical stream in jazz
- and what is crucial to remember in the traditions of lament and blues that they do not leave us stuck in pain and sorrow – in the midst of that badness, they sing out the power of goodness, the right to be treated with justice and kindness, the humble resilience that comes from walking with God into God's future
- that's what I always hear in jazz it's love music it's God's melody line, sometimes faintly heard beneath, between the lines of pain and sorrow – but it always resolves in a resonant harmonious healing in the end
- and the music draws you into participating in that healing that is how you find the goodness that God gave you in your creation and how you find ways of sharing it for the goodness of the whole world
