## Light It Up!

## Matthew 5:14-15

You are the light of the world. A city built on a hill cannot be hid. No one after lighting a lamp puts it under the bushel basket, but on the lamp stand, and it gives light to all in the house.

 I love 'Skylark' – such a great melody – swinging and soaring – and these powerful and poignant words in the chorus:

> I don't know if you can find these things but my heart is riding on your wings so if you see them anywhere won't you lead me there.

- This chorus speaks to a deep human longing the longing for love – it's a repeating theme in jazz, the laments of the blues
- Let me play around with this chorus a little bit I'm going to read a
  bit of theology into it and perhaps shed some light on what it
  might mean in the larger scheme of things
- In the Bible, the Holy Spirit, God's continuing presence embracing the world with God's love, is often portrayed as a bird – mostly a dove – but let's expand our horizons and imagine this skylark in Johnny Mercer's lyrics as God's Spirit – carrying our souls on its wings and leading us to those things that will satisfy our longings for a love that nourishes us to flourish – in the Christian tradition, the source of such love is God, whose nature we see most clearly in Jesus Christ – it is the work of the Spirit to carry us there and embrace us into an unshakeable relationship with the steadfast love of God
- That relationship is the light of the world Matthew talks about it's
  not meant for us alone, but it is meant to flow through us into the
  world as a blessing that's what happens with music as well –
  whether it's the trio's take on standards or their offering of Jonny's
  originals, they are making that music light up our souls so let's
  listen to more of the inspiration in that music
