 I can lose myself in rapt joy listening to Ella Fitzgerald – her various renditions of 'My Romance' (Rogers & Hart) are among my favourites – the refrain of this song resonates deeply within my soul:

Wide awake,
I can make my most fantastic dreams come true.
My romance doesn't need a thing but you.

- As many of you know, I have a habit of reading theology into jazz lyrics and riffs – I am convinced that the God who saved the world in Jesus Christ after generations of inviting humanity back into the companionship of creation continues to work out this intent within and well beyond the church – like in the jazz tradition – so, here I go again!
- Fitzgerald had a troubled love life except when it came to her love of the music as it carried the lyrics and the effort she put into making that love work her singing is a work of love and you can feel it every time that unique voice makes the air vibrate something took over, working in her and through her and radiating through her audiences I choose to see it as the love of God and I understanding that love most deeply when I listen to the Spirit's witness to how that love shaped the life and redemptive work of Jesus of Nazareth
