The Power of Prayer

(Ps 121 and Luke 22:39-46)



"Father, if you are willing, remove this cup from me; yet not my will but yours be done."

(Luke 22: 42)

How does this fit into the story of God's forgiving and reconciling love

Most of you know that I am a restless soul – especially in my physical presence – I don't stay still well – that has remained true during this time of relative confinement in the condo as we collaborate to control the coronavirus – so I wander around the rooms in our 987 square foot space – in that space are a lot of books – and I've made some wonderful discoveries – "I didn't know I'd bought that book! Let's see what's inside!" – this past week, I was drawn (I do think it's the work of the Spirit provoking a focused fascination) to the 50th anniversary edition of the English translation Karl Barth's seminars on the Lord's Prayer in Neuchatel between 1947 and 1949 – from a shorthand transcription in French, then translate English by Sara F Terrian – the 50th anniversary edition features essays by distinguished Reformed theologians in the USA – John Hesselink, Daniel Migliore, and Donald McKim – so, a wonderful example of how we formulate and reformulate our understanding of God's faith in conversation with God, others, and ourselves – the invitation I accepted in this discovery was to ponder more deeply the power of prayer, especially in the midst of this pandemic

Provocations to ponder

This is still very much a work in progress – I have not seen myself as a person of prayer in any disciplined sense – but I am reframing that, for reasons that may become apparent as we reflect further together – so far, in my reflections, the Spirit has drawn my attention to two dynamics in prayer that have the power to reform my understanding of this aspect of God's faith in us – God's patient and persistent pestering of us to accept the invitation to participate more consciously and fully in Christ's mission

• First, prayer is a conversation initiated by God – in everything God has done to forgive and reconcile the world to its original intent – of being an interdependent, mutually-enriching community where blessing abounds – it's in that grand vision

- of flourishing that each of us, in the depths of our fears and needs, finds God's answer to our prayers prayers God has provoked before we find the words prayers God knows before we do Barth places great emphasis on Jesus, the Christ, praying for us and with us embracing our needs into the self-giving love of the triune God carrying our longings into the ultimate caring of the Holy Trinity that flourishing for all of creation is the will of God
- Second, prayer, then, is the central dynamic of our Christian discipleship –
 everything we do, personally and communally, is a form of prayer a form of
 conversation with God in the sense that it is part of the Spirit aligning our
 flourishing in the energy of God's forgiving and reconciling love what we
 confess to be the most powerful force in creation when we refuse that invitation
 to align, we generate trauma for each other and lament for God but the
 invitation persists, pestering us to reform with your next breath, with my gift of
 your next breath, focus your attention over here on the possibilities for generating
 blessing instead of trauma you can do it, with my redeeming support but you
 have to accept the invitation into that possibility

Possibilities for our missioning at Brentwood

I'll speak for me and pray that the Spirit provokes possibilities for you – I am becoming more conscious of the opportunities I have in my way of being to engage in more intentional conversations with God – as I look back, that's been happening for my whole life – but I had not been awakened to its presence and power – this pandemic reformulation of my habits has made me more aware of God's invitations into conversation – I hope these reflections have awakened you to some of those dynamics in your lives as well – stay safe, dear friends in Christ, and help others do the same
